The FMG stadium is located in Hamilton central and hosts rugby games. The stadium has a rich history dating back 100 years. In 1934 the roof of the basic original grandstand collapsed, no one was injured, and in 1958 the construction of a new grandstand began. That construction remains today and is now called the Porter Group Stand. This is where I was seated and I'm pleased to say the roof remained structurally sound, throughout the Chiefs rugby match I was attending.

My friend had bought our tickets online as he's a member so that made that process easy. I had done my study on the Chiefs' website, so had a rough idea on where we could park, we got lucky and parked in a school field for \$10.

The stadium had light up signs saying gate 1 and gate 4. Finding our seats however proved difficult, because we had bought our tickets online we had to keep looking at our phone to see what number while also trying to juggle our bags, team scarf and jackets. The ticket was confusing with aisle number, row letter and the seat number for someone who's dyslexic I was right confused. We eventually found our seats after a few wrong turns.

I strongly advise that some policies should be carried out by governments to encourage people to move to smaller regional towns. This essay will discuss the problems in large cities and explain the reasons to support my view.

Firstly, city dwellers have to endure the pressure from high living costs like housing, power, water and petrol. Heavy traffic is also a major problem because it results in wasting time and pollution. Most people have to spend lots of time in the traffic to get to work and to get home.

The quality of air and water is often worse in a big city. Heavy traffic also results in expensive fees or insufficient space for parking cars. In a big city like Auckland in New Zealand, when people go to the zoos, hospitals, or shopping complexes, there is often a high fee for parking their cars, or people find it difficult to find a space to park their cars. In addition, more population may result in less access for people to be close to nature. Research shows that the risk for serious mental illness is generally higher in big cities than in rural areas. Being close to nature could promote positive moods.

As people are suffering from the problems that they have to face daily in big cities, I strongly recommend that the governments sort out some practical solutions to encourage people to move to smaller regional towns. They should put aside more funding into support and promote public services like transportation and hospitals in the smaller regional towns. In addition, devolution of policy making powers would leave many lesser cities freer from central governments than ever, so they can build amenities for people to live in.



A Trip to Whangarei to Buy Calves

We bought 35 calves. Seven of them are mine. They are black and white faced and red and white Hereford Cross Friesian. The rest of them are Murray Grey Cross Friesian, which are David's and Aimee's. 28 for them, 7 for us. On the farm where we bought the calves, they had two horses in a stable. They are show horses that compete in dressage. The kids got a lamb. It is five days old and they have to feed him three hourly. The lamb's name is Lambo. The kids love Lambo. And the dogs get on well with Lambo too.

Arrival of the Calves

The calves came from Whangarei to Wellsford, 35 of them. It took the truck driver 9 hours to get to us. The calves were hungry and thirsty and they were very skittish. We fed them and gave them a drink.

Call out for the Vet. We had two calves that the vet had to look at. The vet said they had an infection from the umbilical cord.

They had to have an injection for seven days. The vet showed us how to give the injection to the calves. You tap the calf on the back three times and give the injection. It was very hard for my wife Ann and I to get the calves in the cattle yard for their injections. The calves were not happy to have it done.

Drenching Time

We all took part in getting the calves into the corral for drenching. First, we had to weigh them for the correct dose, and then we had to pour the drench on to the back of the calves.

We had one calf that had a sore leg. The calf was limping. We had the vet take a look at the calf and he said he has a broken leg, and he had to put the calf down. It was a sad day for us and the family.

Drenching Again

It is time to drench again. We got the calves into the corral for drenching. We had a lot of trouble getting one calf into the corral. The calf would not go in. We had to push it into the corral. David, our son-in-law, brought a wand that reads the weight of the calves. The name tag tells you if the calves have gained weight. You also then know the correct dose to give each calf. We then poured the drench on the back of each calf.



The Arrival of Four New Lambs

David and Aimee brought four lambs to keep Lambo (the pet lamb) happy. The lambs are black faced lambs. Lambo is not interested in them. He thinks he is a dog. Lambo started eating Ann's vege garden. He ate the tomatoes and the carrots. Ann was very, very, very cross with him. She quickly put up a fence to stop him from eating the vege garden.

Runaway Lambs

Kaiaua



NEW CALEDONIA TRIP

Last month, I had a chance to travel to New Caledonia. It was the first time I had travelled overseas to a foreign country from New Zealand, so I was excited about this trip.

Because I work as a food auditor, my job requires me to travel a lot. Our head office in Auckland oversees auditing in multiple restaurants in the Pacific area which include New Zealand, Fiji, New Caledonia, and Samoa. For this round, my boss assigned me to travel to New Caledonia to audit four restaurants.

As I only have a New Zealand Residency visa, I had to submit a travelling visa application for my trip. First, I filled in my information on the French Embassy website and then booked an appointment with them in Wellington for an interview.

New Caledonia is an independent country, but it is one of the French islands in the Pacific area, and the French government has control of it. Thus, the French Embassy in Wellington has the authority for visa approval.

In my application, I had to provide documents to explain the purpose and plans for my stay in New Caledonia. This process took more than two weeks

While waiting for my visa approval, I found out some details about my destination such as currency, hotel, cuisine, and culture as well as local people and several places where I could visit when I had free time.

On 25th February, I received my traveling visa. I bought the flight tickets from Air New Zealand and booked a hotel near the restaurants and the shuttle service at Noumena airport. On 19th March, I left my house at 4 am to get the earliest flight from Christchurch to Auckland airport. Waking up early annoyed me, but I had no option.

The flights from NZ to NC are only twice per week and all flights must transit at Auckland so it requires departing quite early in the morning. Around 7 am, I arrived in Auckland and walked to the international airport to get the second flight to New Caledonia. I could have taken the airport bus from the domestic arrival to the international departure, but I chose to walk because I needed the exercise.

Besides, it was not too far, and it took only 10 minutes. Maybe the same time to get the bus due to waiting time.

Because of a 3-hour flight, the plane provided a small computer tablet that travellers could use to kill time during the flight. I did not use the tablet, as I slept all the time because I was tired due to the early awake.

My boss had told me I would be served a meal on the plane, but it was only a snack. I did not prepare enough food and I was very hungry. Fortunately, two nearby passengers gave me some food. They were French and they were visiting their son in New Caledonia. We only talked a little because they could not speak English well while I could not speak French.

Arriving at Noumea airport, I had to spend time around 30 minutes with security staff checking passports and luggage declarations.

Afterward, I quickly found the agency to buy a Wi-Fi pocket for all my trips here. Then I caught the shuttle to get to the hotel. I cannot imagine how far it was. It took one long hour from the airport to the hotel called "Le Meridien". I was a bit disappointed at the long travel time.



Nevertheless, the hotel was beautiful and luxurious. At the front of the hotel was a magnificent waterfall which was even more amazing at night with a lot of colourful lights.

The back of the hotel had a big clean swimming pool and many tall, green coconut trees. And my hotel owned a long, blue beach with rippling waves and beautiful white sand. Unfortunately, I did not swim any time during my stay because I cannot swim. I have attached a picture of the hotel.

Because of hunger, I ordered a meal including chips and chicken nuggets which looked like a kid's portion. How expensive it was! I paid 1800 CFX which was equivalent to \$28. I enjoyed my meal where my table overlooked the beautiful beach. I felt peaceful and lonely and just wished my kids could have been there. Then I got to my room and slept nearly one hour before the first audit

The first restaurant was not too far from my hotel, so I decided to walk instead of calling a taxi. Also, this was a chance to go sightseeing. I walked around 20 minutes and started my first audit at 3 pm. Although the area manager was French, he could speak English, while all the staff only spoke a little bit.

It was advantageous for me to communicate with him during the visit. The restaurant was quite big and well organized. My duration was nearly 2 and a half hours and they met the standards.


After that, I informed the manager about my audit schedule and would see him the next day in the three remaining restaurants. I left at 5:30 pm and walked along the beach to come back to the hotel. This period here was a dry season so it was quite hot and humid with a temperature of 290°C. I loved this weather because it reminded me of my hometown in Vietnam.

There were a lot of people who were sitting, walking, and swimming on the beach. Some of them were local people whom I could recognize by their dark skin, some were travellers and others I guessed were French who had lived there for a long time.

On the way, I made a video call with my children to show them about New Caledonia. They were excited and wished that they could travel with me next time. My son would love to swim on the beach.

I intended that I would walk down that night to taste local food. Around 7 pm, I walked back to the street and found some restaurants. How surprising it was. There was a Vietnamese restaurant. I guessed that there must be a Vietnamese community as well.

A bar on the beach was quite crowded and had noisy music and it was not my cup of tea. Finally, I chose one restaurant called the Steakhouse where I enjoyed steak cooked on the hot stone, delicious!



The restaurant owner told me that she had to keep the stones in the oven at 4000°C within 24 hours before serving. OMG!


I ordered beef grilled on the stone and some salad with green beans. It was juicy, tender, and the smell was so good. I loved it.

I had a day with three audits that made me tired. Each audit took two and a half hours. I had more than eight hours total for that day. I felt exhausted and only wanted to sleep as soon as possible. But thinking about the next day I felt excited because it was my day off and I had a chance to go sightseeing.

After a long sleep, I woke up early for sightseeing. Because NC was quite small, I decided to walk all the time. I visited the local market which sold ready-to-eat food, fruit, seafood, and souvenirs.

I bought 'Nem' for my breakfast and a banana and avocado for my lunch. I found that Nem is quite like the spring roll of Vietnamese food. I enjoyed them.



Next, I walked to Coconut Square. It looked like a park with multiple trees, but I could not find any coconut trees. Ridiculous! Then I walked along the street to arrive at the Aquarium Museum where I waited to see the marine ecosystem.

Amazing! I could see everything in the sea. Sea worms with a strange appearance were hiding in the colourful coral. Opposite were clear jellies that swam up and down and created a beautiful and mysterious scene.



In another room, I thought I was in the amazing seabed where each school of fish is swimming freely.

Furthermore, I was attracted to sea turtles. The big turtles swam excitedly into the clear water. Sometimes, they stopped and looked at me as a strange creature standing to watch them attentively.
